Japan or to celebrate their previous time in Japan. In the fall of 2024, we decided to
expand activities off-base and throughout the southern portion of New England and the
group now does business as the Japan-America Society of Southern New England
(JASNE) while still using the original name for the on-base activities.

It's my pleasure to introduce **Ms. Cydonie Brown** — a proud **U.S. Navy veteran** whose journey has carried her across oceans, cultures, and classrooms. Cydonie began her military service at **Misawa Air Base in Japan**, where she was stationed from **1989 to 1992**. It was there that she experienced her very first snowfall — and discovered just how cold a Japanese winter could be! Those early years abroad planted the seeds for a lifelong love of



travel, learning, and cultural exchange. After returning home, Cydonie earned an Associate's Degree in Language Arts from Laney College in Oakland, California, followed by a Bachelor's Degree from San Francisco State University. She went on to complete a Master's in Public Administration from Capella University, blending her passion for education and public service. Her career has taken her to some of the most inspiring corners of our country. She served as a National Park Service Ranger, working at six different national parks — including that "little hole in the ground" we all know as the Grand Canyon. She later became a Lead Supervisor at the Smithsonian National Museum of African American History and Culture, where she helped share powerful stories of heritage, resilience, and pride. Cydonie also returned to Japan as an English Conversation Instructor in Osaka and Yokohama, continuing to bridge cultures through language and education.
