




The Program on U.S.-Japan Relations Harvard University

ENGAGEMENT WITH GLOBAL EDUCATION

The MIT Japan Program was established by Richard Samuels in 1981 as a program of the Center for International Studies and is now led by Christine Pilcavage.

The program serves students, faculty and staff at MIT and universities, research institutes, traditional companies, and start ups in Japan through internships and research activities.

The program serves the larger Japan oriented community in New England through outreach activities.

PRIMARY ACTIVITIES

- Provides fully funded internships and research opportunities that allow MIT students to tackle real world problems with traditional firms, start ups, research institutes and universities in Japan. Students can also participate in more traditional study abroad programs with the University of Tokyo and the Institute of Science Tokyo.
- Administers the Hayashi-ULVAC Seed Fund to supports collaboration between faculty and researchers at MIT and at universities and research institutions in Japan. Maximum award of \$30,000

CONTRIBUTIONS TO JAPAN RELATED COMMUNITY

- MIT Japan Program provides cultural, political and economic programming on Japan and on Japan-US relations.
- Programming features a mix of films, music and speakers and is typically open to the larger Japan oriented community.
- These events are sometimes done in partnership with other organizations.

HOW JAPAN RELATED ORGS CAN SUPPORT

 The MIT Japan Program and other Japan related nonprofits may cooperate by co-listing events and sharing information.

STRENGTHS BROUGHT TO US-JAPAN NETWORKS

- MIT Japan Program node in transnational S&T network.
- MIT Center for International Studies hosted diplomats Okamoto Yukio and Mori Yusuke and trained educators, technologists and journalists including Inoguchi Takashi, Suzuki Tatsujiro and Fukumoto Yoko






MISSION

- JACL is oldest and largest Asian American civil rights organization in the US.
- JACL is a membership based organization with 113 chapters, 8 regional districts and 24000 members in 23 states.
- JACL mission is to defend human and civil rights of Americans of Japanese ancestry and others victimized by injustice.



INVOLVEMENT IN GLOBAL EDUCATION

- The Kakehashi Project builds relationships between Japan and Japanese Americans through an 8 day trip featuring visits to historical sites, cultural activities, lectures, workshops and a home stay.
- Alumni become effective advocates in improving US-Japan relations.
- Project is a partnership of the Japan International Cooperation Center (JICE) and JACL with funding from MoFA
- Eligibility: Students and professionals 18 to 27 years old, Japanese Americans by heritage or adoption.



CIVIL LIBERTIES

- 1940s focus on mass imprisonment of Japanese Americans.
- 1950s reforming immigration and citizenship laws.
- 1960s joined in Civil Rights movement
- 1970s and 80s redress for those imprisoned during WWII.
- Post 9-11 defense of civil rights of Arab Americans and Muslims
- 2000s joined in struggle to advance LGBT rights
- 2025 JACL opposing xenophobic refugee and migration policies








Who We Are


